





What is a PhD?

• Degree awarded based on:

- Extensive and original research in their chosen field usually submitted in submitted a thesis or dissertation
- Usually requires 3-5 years of full-time study
- Alternatively, the ward can be based on a portfolio of published papers, while some countries require coursework to be submitted as well (Haidar, 2023)

What is Research?

- Careful **search** or **inquiry**, endeavor to **discover facts** by scientific study of a subject or critical investigation (Baban, 2009)
- •Planned investigation employing recognized scientific methodology en-route for explaining, solving problems and creating new knowledge that is generally applicable (Grinnell 1993)
- Systematic exploration designed to advance knowledge and understanding of a subject.
 - o Seek analyze and deduce information about people, objects and nature
 - Revise available information in light of new information
 - Interpret outcomes and communicate these interpretations

To obtain a PhD

•The candidate is usually engaged in 3-5 years of *Planned investigation employing* recognized scientific methodology en-route for explaining, solving problems and creating new knowledge that is generally applicable and documenting the outcomes of this in a thesis/dissertation!

Research Process

Types of Research

FUNDAMENTAL

- To improve understanding of general issues without emphasis on immediate applications
- May not have not immediately appear to have immediate or obvious link to concrete issues or problems affecting society
- May have unexpected results, lead to new theories

APPLIED RESEARCH

- Designed to apply findings to solving a problem (perceived or actual)
- •Fundamental research may lead to findings that can be applied.

Research Types & Examples

FUNDAMENTAL RESEARCH

- Einstein's General Theory of Relativity (e=mc^2)
- Which parts of the human genome explains the complexity of an organism?
- The value of classical music to cultural diversification?
- Determining the computational limits of microprocessors.
- What factors contributed to the exquisite are of the renaissance?
- The influence of reggae music and Bob Marley on Africa's decolonization efforts.

APPLIED RESEARCH

- Does the use of a particular drug lead to better health outcomes?
- Do engineers who get better pay produce more efficient vehicles?
- How does learning musical instrument impact development is dyslexic adults?
- Does the modification of plant enzyme make it produce larger quantities?
- What combination of transports types provide the most efficient movement of people in the city of London?

Research Objectives and Methods

Defining Research Purpose/Objective s II

DESCRIPTIVE

- Describes phenomena as they exist
- Identify, collect and review information on issue/problem
- Research questions may explore:
 - feelings, behaviour (of things or people), characteristics of the studied objects or subjects
 - Statistical techniques to analyze and present information/findings
 - Summarize moods, feelings, general responses/views

EXPLORATORY

- Examine patterns or ideas that lead to a proposition that can be tested for association or causality (hypothesis).
- Testing usually requires empirical evidence (gathered from either observation or experimentation) for assessing/analysing the problem.
- Used to gain insights in subject area, prepare for more rigorous investigation
 - Case studies, observation, historical analysis

Defining Research Purpose/Objective s II


CORRELATIONAL

- Used to discover relationships, identify causes and effects.
- Need prior information about the problem and identify variables of interest
- Collect data (must be quantifiable), Check for relationships
- Examples:
 - Relationship between class attendance and grades (observational)
 - Divorce rates among couples who live together (Survey)
 - Violence and economics (Archival)

EXPLANATORY (ANALYTICAL)

- Provides explanation on how and why.
- Requires use and control of variables and research activities to allow checking for effects and outcomes of changes

Research Methods III

CONTENT ANALYSIS

 Study of content in various formats: text, video, audio to identify patterns, characteristics, relationships or new knowledge.

- Patterns in pop and afrobeats music videos 2015-2022
- Shakespeare and medieval literature

SURVEY

- Sampling units of a population to be analyzed statistically.
- In human surveys, questionnaires are often used to elicit answers to specific questions

What is the expected outcome of the next elections and what factors may impact the outcome?

DISCOURSE ANALYSIS

 Analyze the use of language (written, sign, voice, semiotic events) usually to better understand social practices, cultural issues, identity and group dynamics.

- Prose in African dialects
- Expressions of music in rituals of Christianity
- Relevance of the beatitudes and modern societal adaptations.

Research Methods IV

CAUSAL MODELING / EXPERIMENTS

- Investigate relationships using tests controlled by the researcher
 - Does exposure to specific levels of smoke in enclosed areas have an impact on breathing?
 - How does a computer processor perform when streaming three or more videos from remote sources?

•LONGITUDINAL STUDIES

- Continuous or repeated measurement or observation of individuals or phenomena over a long period of time (usually many years)
 - Impact of childhood values on adult relationships
 - Comparative assessment of plant growth patterns in remote uninhabited regions and densely populated cities
 - Does training a child the way they should grow results in them not departing from it when they grow old?

SYSTEMS DEVELOPMENT/DESIGN SCIENCE

- Develop and artefact (software, algorithm, method/process, device)
- Describe the quality, test and demonstrate uses/effectiveness






